Mowanjum Community, only has a population of 300 - 500 residents, however what they lack in population they make up for in their Art. Such a community rich with culture and arts hosted many organisations from the Kimberley region to attend a Services Expo.

During our Womens "Safe Space" we had the pleasure of having 2017 Uluru Delegate




Cherie Sibosado, who was able to give us a better understanding of the referendum, and how the voice would make a huge impact for our mob as we continuously fight against reconciliation.

<u>Aboriginal Mental Health First Aid.</u>

During October our staff had the opportunity to complete the Aboriginal Mental Health First Aid Course with Brendan Cox and Michael McKenzie of KAMS.

The training is designed to be culturally appropriate and provides a greater perspective and understanding of Aboriginal social and emotional wellbeing.



The course is suitable for adults who live, love and work with Aboriginal

people. It enables participants to feel more confident in identifying mental health issues and providing initial mental health first aid, whilst supporting someone access to appropriate help.

Our staff were able to learn the signs and symptoms of mental health problems, where and how to get help and what sort of help has been shown by research to be effective.

Following the course, those who completed the assessment are now accredited Mental Health First Aiders for the next 3 years.

As we are closely approaching the end of 2023, there is still no sign of things slowing down. However, we are preparing plans, events and services for 2024!
